Policy: Local: focus more on education and information, and do not express positions until they have thorough representation from businesses and partners. When presenting data, make it personal to the government representative (how many of their constituents are affected) and include real people's stories if possible. State: focus on 5 key principles, then track bills related to issues such as Work-based education, Drive to 55 etc. Alert members when any pertinent issues arise. National: National Chamber may ask members to sign-on to issues. Local chamber representative committee decides whether to sign on or not.
