	0	Universal Free Lunch Bill ended in a 3/5 vote in the Subcommittee of Education Administration. Likely it was the fiscal note, which had been negotiated to \$250M down from \$350M		
	0	Femeika and Alexis's Maternal Health Bill made it through the Health subcommittee and received unanimous support from the Senate Subcommittee.		
	0	Just 2 weeks ago Alexis and Femeika testified in the GOP passing SB1832 on a 6-2-1 vote, followed by a unanimous 9-0 vote in the Health & Welfare Committee on the Senate floor.
